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General Information

Description

This class is designed to give you the skills and experience to look at events facing our world and understand the context and situations involved. We will be keeping up with the news and discussing the stories in historical and political context. This class will be a large amount of class discussion. Each week the class will break into small groups and discuss the top news of the day and how it relates to our class lectures. It will be vitally important to keep updated on the news of the world and be ready to discuss the items in detail.

Upon successful completion of this course, you should be able to:

- Understand the political, historical, economic and cultural context of major current world events
- Discuss with confidence current world events with other informed individuals
- Understand the complexities of world politics and the interwoven nature of major events and issues
- Be able to differentiate between reliable and unreliable sources of news information

Description of Graded Components

Participation

Throughout the course, your participation in class activities and discussions will be evaluated. At the very least, you are expected to be attentive and engaged. A high participation grade will reflect regular

valuable/constructive contributions to group or class discussions. Your attendance will also determine your participation grade. Because class time is valuable, you will lose ten points from your participation grade for each unexcused absence and five points for each tardy. You can have one unexcused absence without penalty. **Please notify the TA in advance via email about absences from class.**

Map Quiz

You will be given maps of the world with no labels. You will be asked to label as many countries as you can in 30 minutes. You will be given one point per correctly labelled country. Only member states of the United Nations will be counted.

Midterm and Final

There will be two exams during the semester. Both will be multiple-choice exams that you will be given the length of the class to finish (or the final exam period of the final). The final will be cumulative.

Event Paper

During the semester, you will write 1 one-page essay where you give a description of a current event and relate it back to material we've covered in the course. The paper should be double-spaced, 12-point Times New Roman font with 1-inch margins. Papers must be handed in at the beginning of class.

Student-Faculty Expectations Agreement

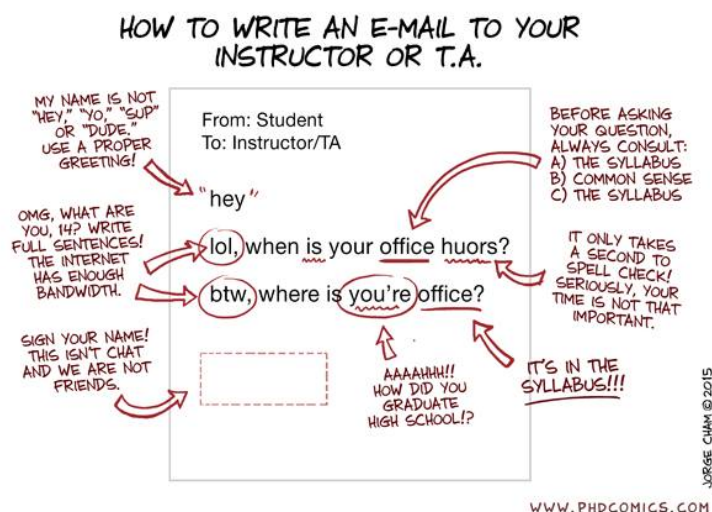
