This course is organized around the concept of the Revolution in Military Affairs (RMA). RMAs involve significant changes in technology applied to military purpose, and corresponding changes in military organization and operational art leading to new conceptions of the way warfare is conducted. Since the time of Napoleon it is widely believed that there have been several such RMAs (including the development of nuclear weapons which is outside of the purview of this course) and that another, driven by the information technology and microelectronics revolution, is underway at the present time. The character of these revolutions will be explored through a series of historical case studies, with special emphasis on the evolution of military technology, its impact on military organization, and the nature and role of innovation in these processes.

This class provides an introduction to contemporary African development. Starting from the end of WWII and the early periods of decolonization, we will examine some of the many forces that shape contemporary Africa: economics and development, the structure of states, conflict and peace, culture and art, illness and health, technology and communications. Interrogating these issues, we will see Africa through a series of transitions: from war to peace, from one party to multi party democracies, from state to private sector driven economies. While we will examine these issues from a continental or regional lens, this class will mostly make use of particular country case studies.

This term will offer a special focus on political development and elections. We will use the Nigerian national election, occurring in early 2015, as a real-time real-world case study. Opportunities will be available to serve as a local, or in some cases Nigeria based, election watcher.

The class will be structured as 50% readings, lecture and discussion; and 50% as a project based class. Example class projects include an elections and political development study; Nollywood film making; and water resource management.

Space technologies permeate many aspects of our lives, from the GPS applications in our phones to satellite remote sensing that underlies international security verification. We hear about experiments in the International Space Station or see images taken by the Hubble Space Telescope. But how do policy-makers decide what new space missions to fund, where to focus exploration, and what industry developments to encourage or allow, and what do they plan to do next?

In this course, we will examine a range of current international space policy issues, including civil, military, and commercial activities. We will look at the origins and evolution of space policy over time and examine its strategic role in international affairs. The course will introduce students to a range of current challenges and debates in space policy, such as current international human exploration strategies, technical and political problems and potential solutions related to space debris, efforts at international cooperation in satellite Earth observations, and recent developments and possibilities in the commercial space launch sector. This course will expose students to the debates and decisions that have shaped global space activities and the policy issues that must be addressed to meet future goals.

This course will provide practical exercises and case studies in international impact evaluation. The course will focus on each of the eight Millennium Development Goals, review case studies that cover various techniques of econometric research (principally quasi-experimental research designs) to examine the impact of policies designed to achieve each of the goals. This will provide three unique learning outcomes: 1) a deep understanding of the economic development challenges related to the achievement of millennium development goals; 2) a survey of econometric techniques as applied to practical problems of economic development, including problems of poverty mitigation, health and education improvement and political governance; and 3) experience in developing a research paper that applies a quantitative research design (this would be an end of the semester requirement).

The course will be geared to upper-level undergraduate students as well as graduate students. It will avoid mention of the theory of econometric and statistical estimators, but will, instead, focus on the practical application of econometric techniques to examine economic and political impacts. And a great deal of emphasis will be given to the case studies on Africa.

More specifically, can Saudi Arabia, Russia, and Iran use hydrocarbon exports for strategic leverage? Are the U.S. and China doomed to compete for access to global energy supply? Will there be a nuclear energy renaissance, and if so, will it increase the probability of weapons proliferation and regional conflict?

This seminar will explore the structures, strategies, and major objectives of national security policy in responding to insurgencies and small wars. We will address the history, strategic and operational foundations, theory and the role of the theorist, practice and the role of the practitioner, the evolution of US foreign policy, current trends, and the future of counterinsurgency and battling small wars. Cases of counterinsurgency and small wars in Latin America, Africa, the Middle East, and Asia will be examined. Guest speakers including current and former US military officers are anticipated. Particular attention will be given to the insurgencies in Iraq, a predominantly urban insurgency; Afghanistan, which is largely rural; and challenges of insurgencies in mega-cities. Questions to be explored include: What is insurgency and how does it differ from traditional military operations, guerrilla warfare, and terrorism? How have insurgent strategies and tactics changed evolved and what are anticipated futures of insurgencies and counterinsurgency operations? What are the characteristics of successful insurgencies and successful counterinsurgency efforts? What is the role of cultural knowledge in counterinsurgencies? Students will make decisions as a group; prepare and brief topics based on those group decisions; collaboratively develop action and info memos representing governmental entities and write a joint white paper reconciling perspectives that makes recommendations related to current or future challenges; participate in a National Security Council (NSC) simulation; and take part in an exercise modeled on analytical practices of the intelligence community.
